### **Message from Mark Thomas - Headteacher**

"Much education today is monumentally ineffective. All too often we are giving young people cut flowers when we should be teaching them to grow their own plants."

#### John W. Gardner

With its reference to plants and flowers, it is clear this quote resonates with what we try to achieve at Brymore. The boys may be able to pick flowers for Mother's Day, harvest vegetables or produce apple juice, but only because they have helped grow the plants in the first place. However, I believe the words of John W. Gardner accurately describe the full Brymore experience. In order to produce fully rounded, educated young men we believe you learn by doing rather than simply being told and that building foundations through hard work, is how success is ultimately achieved. This term has seen countless examples of that. On Open Day the whole school worked together culminating in record takings, visitor numbers and future student enquiries. It was clear for all to see the manners, respect and hard work shown by the boys of Brymore. Year 11 are on course to achieve an exceptional set of results, with ICT, agriculture and horticulture already reporting record figures. The feedback from employers following Year 10 work experience has been extremely positive and the sheer commitment shown by all boys at the swimming gala was clear for all to see.

I strongly believe that it is the full Brymore experience that makes the difference to so many boys. Many achieve results that they would never have achieved elsewhere which then opens doors that would have been otherwise firmly closed. Once through the doors, I also believe boys are then well equipped to make the most of the opportunities presented to them through the appreciation of hard work, the ability to work with others, show manners and dignity and the acceptance that you have to make things happen in life.

Those of you who attended the swimming gala will know that it is this collective will and determination from the boys, parents, staff, old boys, governors and friends that has led to the Minister for Schools (David Laws) visiting the school, the Secretary of State (Michael Gove) requesting more information due to the 'overwhelming level of correspondence received relating to Brymore' and the Prime Minister mentioning the school in a speech recently. Not bad for a small, specialist secondary school in Somerset. More details can be found elsewhere in this newsletter, but I would like to put on record my thanks to everyone who has supported us which has quite simply helped secure the future of the school.

### Open Day 2013

We were delighted to welcome the return of the sunshine in time for Open Day this year and with no contingencies needed for potential muddy fields the day went swimmingly.

As people arrived in droves (and superbly car parked by Mr Oliver and his team of boys) the events in the main field kicked off with the preliminary stock-showing rounds run by the farm, but especially Mr Bryant, and the formal presentation of the placings of the boys on show with their cows. A huge attraction last year was Freddie Parker and her duck herding collie dogs who returned for another successful couple of rounds in the ring, along with the dog agility team from Heavens Gate dog sanctuary. One of the highlights of the day was the grand parade of cattle with the boys and Mr Kingston showing their handling skills around the



ring and talking to the crowd about this. The workshops were a hive of activity with boys giving practical demonstrations of metalwork, woodwork and showing their excellent pieces created this year. The forge was also busy with Brymore boys showcasing their skills. The day was completed in the ring with the tug-of-war contest with Walker House proving victorious!

The teaching block was opened giving people the opportunity to see the work of the boys across the curriculum and the many resources used in lessons. Room 2 was the base for ICT and Maths, Room 3 for English, History and Learning Support, Room 5 for static displays of Agri and Horti and many science experiments were underway in Room 6.

The farm, as always, did a fantastic job of getting the boys ready for stock-showing in the weeks building up to the day along with using their resources to show off what a great facility we have with everything from hatching chicks to a milking demonstration.

The gardens looked spectacular as ever and the Horticultural department ran the Brymore Flower Show with entries from boys, staff and students at local schools. The walled gardens provided a chance for the public to see the plots and many of the boys proudly sold produce that they had grown and picked that day. With the Brymore Young Farmers Club putting on a medieval slot machine game and the Old Brymorians hosting the annual raffle it really proved to be a day for everyone.























### **Academy Conversion Update**

We have recently been informed that the Secretary of State has agreed in principle for Brymore School to become a sponsored Academy. It is hoped that this will be confirmed on 14 August 2013 where the sponsors and myself have to present the final documents to the DfE outlining the future plans. Brymore has faced an uncertain few years, where reduced funding from government and falling boarding numbers (although much less than many other state boarding schools) has threatened its very existence. I have tried where possible to be open with parents, but at the same time not wishing to create any undue worry. Over the past few months much of my time has been spent working with others to put a five year financial plan together, to convince the DfE that we are worth backing. This has mainly focussed around raising student numbers through increasing our age range to include Year 7 and 8 boys. I am pleased to say Lord Nash recently agreed a funding package, which along with support from the Local Authority, secured around £1.4 million over the next three years. This will allow us to meet the financial projections in the five year plan and quite simply continue to offer the boys the experience they deserve, without the need to compromise on class sizes, facilities or staffing levels. This is why working with Bridgwater College has been, and will continue to be, so important. Much of the work to secure the funding has been a joint effort and the opportunities to make efficiency savings in the future are obvious. What has also made a difference is the efforts of parents and 'Old Boys' in supporting Brymore through our land based campaign. This came at exactly the time our profile needed raising and the right people were certainly made aware of the benefits of Brymore. I am sure that by working with the college, our future is not only secure but our reputation can only continue to grow.

The consultation documentation is on our website and everyone is free to complete the online questionnaire. Key information includes:

- 1. Brymore will be known as Brymore Academy, however as we have done over the past few years the word 'Academy' will be dropped from all publicity material much as 'school' has been dropped in the past. All of our current letter heads, signage, adverts etc simply refer to Brymore and will continue to do so. All literature will also refer to the fact that we are an Academy sponsored by Bridgwater College.
- 2. Class sizes will continue to be around 15-23 with no planned increase.
- 3. The curriculum will continue to focus on land based and a practical education, although with greater choice.
- 4. The planned increase in fees will remain in line with inflation. A further increase may be necessary; however this is something we will do everything we can to avoid.
- 5. We are not yet able to confirm whether we can take Year 8 in 2014, or whether admission will be for Years 7 and 9 only for that year.

### **Curriculum Changes/Art**

As you are no doubt aware the retirement of Mt Fitzsimons has left us without an art teacher, as we were unable to fill the vacancy. This has resulted in Year 11 students being offered the chance to continue with art (taught by Mr Oliver and supported by Mrs Austin) or GCSE PE, taught by Mr Williams. Year 10 are able to choose between GCSE PE and a BTEC in Engineering. Year 9 will pick up an extra hour of Design & Technology and maths instead of art for next year. It is hoped we can re-introduce art for September 2014 and I am hoping to secure the services of a part time art teacher who may be able to assist Mr Oliver with Year 11 and offer GCSE art as an after school option to Year 10. I will update parents once details are finalised.

holidays ready to supply eggs in the Autumn term.



In terms of the workwear required on the garden please can boys ensure they have overalls (if short sleeved these must be properly sewn and not ripped) and steel toe capped wellingtons or work boots. We require boys to wear work clothes under their overalls and not their school uniform.
