Message from the Headteacher

There is no sincerer love than the love of food ~ George Bernard Shaw

I really do love my job so it is without complaint when I say there are many conflicting demands on Headteachers today. From raising the academic performance of the boys, balancing the various financial budgets within the school, leading staff, dealing with contractors, attending many, many meetings....the list goes on. The one area that has proved the most difficult to crack over the past six years though is none of these things. The hardest thing has been to try and change the boy's perception of food. A recent food survey revealed that boys were complaining about not having enough chips, whilst others complained we serve too many; at breakfast some want more bacon and sausages, others wanted a continental breakfast with similar conflicts proving that it would be impossible to please everyone all of the time! Where things need improving we are certainly listening and changes have been made. However, I thought it was important to look at exactly what the situation is so, on the last Wednesday before we broke up, a typical day, the following was served:

Breakfast: Porridge, *unlimited* cereals and *unlimited* toast. Sausage, beans, tomatoes and egg. *Unlimited* tea/coffee and fruit juice. Milk and *unlimited* fruit.

Lunch: Choice of Piri Piri chicken or meatballs in tomato sauce. Roast potatoes, Caesar pocket bread, tagliatelle, carrots and baked beans. A jacket potato with a choice of cheese, beans or tuna. *Unlimited* salad including salad leaves, coleslaw, beetroot, cous-cous, cucumber, tomatoes, spicy sausage and eggs. A choice of a yoghurt or a flap jack. *Unlimited* fruit.

Tea: A choice of belly pork, chicken and mushroom pie or a creamy corn bake. *Unlimited* new potatoes, mash, carrots and broccoli. *Unlimited* salad (as above) and fruit. A choice of desserts and *unlimited* tea/coffee and fruit juice.

Snacks: Access to bread and preserves, fruit, tea/coffee and fruit.

As a result of comments from boys we now allow them to serve themselves vegetables in the evening, so they can have as much as they want, they have access to unlimited fruit at all meals and salad at both lunch and tea. I am certainly confident they are given enough to eat; I cannot always guarantee they will like all the choices that are available. However, there is certainly a choice. There is now a food group established where boys get a chance to speak with Mr Ryan the chef and catering manager directly. We are continually reviewing our suppliers with a view to improving quality, whilst maintaining value for money. It is worth noting that all of the above is achieved by taking the following from the boarding fees, £1.80 for breakfast and tea and £2.30 for lunch. The evening snacks are funded from the school budget, and so are available to all boys.

So, my message is that we are listening and trying to work with the boys and I would ask parents to support us when we explain to them that they cannot have steak and chips every night, cooked to order, just as they like it. The food group will continue to meet and we will continue to review the food provision at Brymore.

I can report one success, cocoa pops are now available in the morning. We are now trying to educate the boys in the art of filling a bowl twice, rather than trying to get two bowls worth of cocoa pops in a bowl at once. I suspect, this will not be a quick fix!

Thank you for your continued support and I hope everyone has a good holiday.

Horticulture

We started back with a bang in the Horticulture department with a number of trips out, including Monkton Elm Garden Centre and Sanders Garden Centre. The staff at both establishments were very interesting and enlightening and the boys were given lots of information on plants and propagation. On one visit to Monkton Elm we were delighted to be given a number of bulging bags of bulbs to bring back and plant. They have been utilised in lessons as a learning tool and are now planted around the site ready for spring.

During lessons and duties boys have been very busy as there is lots to do. They have been pruning, trimming, preparing and potting plants and pricking out.

The Year 10 boys were offered the opportunity to apply to be HoDs (Head of Department) and after the interview process they have been appointed. It i important to recognise the boys that have stepped up and we thank them for their determination and are looking forward to working with them in their role. I would like to extend our thanks to the outgoing HoDs from Year 11 who have done a sterling job.

The Christmas carol service raised £548.39 and we sent a cheque to the RABI, who help agricultural workers past and present who find themselves in difficulty. This was a great total and more than £200 up on last year. We appreciated all the families that came and donated to this.



Can all parents and carers please ensure that boys have sufficient underclothing, outerclothing and footwear to be working outside. All land based subjects and Forest School go outside even during bad weather so it is vital that boys are warm and dry.

As always our horticulture cart is available on a Saturday afternoon for parents and families to purchase plants, or place orders, so please utilise us! (Mr Willcocks)

Katherine Bigwood, a very proactive member of Somerset YFC, brought in a selection of animal feeds for the boys to identify coupled with a PowerPoint presentation on who is fed what. There were some really interesting combinations and feeds. Who knew crushed biscuits were a valuable source of carbohydrates for cattle? Then Katherine and Jock, who had accompanied her, very kindly gave the boys a demonstration of what to say and an explanation of why you say it when showing or judging stock, using two of the animals from the LRC, Shaun the Sheep and Oxo the cow!

We finished the half term this week with a presentation of a cheque to Musgrove Park Hospital Children's Ward. They were our Charity of choice last year. Joining us for the presentation, made on behalf of Brymore YFC, were Charlie Herbert and his mother. Charlie, now a Level 3 Health and Social Care student at Bridgwater College was a stalwart of the group becoming Chair of the group in Year 10; unfortunately he became very ill in Year 11 and spent a long time on the Children's Ward, prompting our decision to support them. Following on from the presentation the boys went to the farm where Mr Adamson and Mr Hill showed them what would be expected of them if they were to stock judge at the Bath and West Show. Farm News

Dairy - We have had two calves born this half-term, both Beef Shorthorn cross. Ulrika, cow No 54 (Swedish Red) had a bull calf and Faithful, heifer No 1 (Holstein Friesian) had a heifer calf which some boys assisted with. Forrester once again showing the benefit of having a bull on the farm to spot when our dairy cows are on heat when AI (Artificial Insemination) has failed.

Our milk contract has recently been transferred to Muller Wiseman and our milk is now collected daily.

Beef - Last Saturday, following an all clear pre-movement TB test last week, we sent five finished beef cattle to Sedgemoor Auction Centre for sale.

Sheep - Our Kerry Hill ram, Maverick and two Kerry Hill Ewe lambs were sheared to prepare them for showing in May so that a new fleece will have a chance to grow in order to look their best. The Young Farmers are Stock Judging with Mr Adamson and Miss Bradford, aiming to show at the Young Farmers Rally and at the Bath & West Show at Shepton Mallet in June. These three sheep along with some beef cattle will be shown by students.

Lambing - Our ewes should start lambing in less than a month. The lambing should take place over three days and nights on two consecutive weekends, 26th, 27th and 28th February and 4th, 5th and 6th March. The Year 11s are all going to be able to experience their own 'lambing live' when they do a night time duty in the lambing shed. The experience they have and the skills they learn will all be used as evidence for their BTEC qualification. There are also several other staff that are keen to come and help with these lambing weekends. Hopefully there will be many photos and a few videos.

Poultry - Thank you for the amazing response to the plea for egg boxes! Please keep them coming. Our hens have started

laying again after their 'moult' and we are collecting up to 60 eggs a day. We are taking delivery of 40 Point of Lay Pullets (young hens who will start to lay eggs soon) later this week to ensure a good supply of eggs throughout this Spring and Summer. The boys have helped expand our breeding area too.

The Year 7s have been learning about incubation and hatching of eggs this half term and have been able to watch newly hatching chicks which will be reared for future egg laying.

Pigs - The market price for pigs is very poor at present. We will have some 12 - 15 kilo weaners for sale soon so if you like the idea of having some of our piglets to rear please contact the farm office for details. We had some of our Brymore pork made into Tasty Traditional sausages by Butcher Hill in Cannington a few weeks ago, so have frozen sausages for sale at between £3.00 and £3.50 per pack according to weight. We have had very positive feedback from customers who think they are delicious. (Mrs Whyte)





Sports Update

The Chads Hill Run

The first ever running of the new Chads Hill course took place on 4th January 2016. The first record set was 16 minutes 12 seconds. Since then over 220 Brymore boys have recorded a time. The record now stands at 10 minutes 47 seconds held jointly by Huw Scott and Harry Taylor-Page. Many staff have also run the course with the ladies record standing at 14 minutes 46 seconds by Mrs S Austin. Many of the boys have recorded two, three or more personal best times. Certificates are still rewarded under the old system of how many you do. The run takes place every week day including Saturday at 4.00 pm and on Sunday at 3.00 pm. Ask your son for his personal best time to see if he has run the course and if he has improved.

Rugby

The Year 10 rugby team have made the area final and they will be playing a very strong Haygrove team at Bridgwater Albion Rugby Club on Monday 7th March, kick off at 6.00 pm. The school hope to take two coaches full of supporters. Numbers attending practice in the upper school remain excellent however numbers for Year 7 rugby practice are low at the moment so the boys really need to put some work in on that front.

Parental/Guardian Support

Commitment to Brymore comes from both sides of the equation. The boys opt to come to Brymore and therefore should be opting in. Parents and guardians of boys need to understand that for the boys to participate in all the activities on offer their support is needed 100%. Out-boarders who have transport difficulties attending the after prep fitness sessions are allowed, by arrangement, to attend the junior group sessions at 4.30pm on Mondays and Tuesdays. Attendance generally at fitness still stands in the high 90% in all year groups. (Mr Spridgens)


Ski Trip

Thank you to all that attended this years trip and we look forward to the next trip in Easter 2017; the






Gap Tutors

Boarding

With that said, this half term has gone in a flash and has been very busy with students and staff returning to school with increased vigour and relish for school life following the Christmas holiday. January always brings new staff into boarding with the arrival of four new Gap Tutors from Australia and South Africa, and the Brymore boys have certainly made Mr Neate, Mr Olson, Mr Sedgwick and Mr Florance all very welcome whilst they acclimatise themselves the lovely English weather!

We have had a number of external visitors to the boarding houses this term, visiting Brymore for various reasons, with boys always taking the time to introduce themselves and speak positively about their experiences during their time within boarding. It never ceases to amaze me how glowingly visitors speak of their experiences whilst here, which this term I believe is largely down to the wonderful atmosphere that has been created in all the houses by both staff and boys. It is never easy to pinpoint what creates such a healthy atmosphere, but I think it is mostly due to the good nature of the boys we have and the proudness they show for their boarding house and the people within them. The new boys are to be commended for the way in which they have settled into Brymore life, while the returning boys have as always been friendly and welcoming. The mentor teams led by the Head of House deserve a special mention for their efficient work in keeping the houses running smoothly, there is a healthy level of respect between boys of all ages and as such the houses are growing from strength to strength.

This term has also seen the appointment of two new members of staff who will be joining the boarding team after the Easter holidays, and we as a school are very excited and pleased with the new appointments made and what they can bring to boarding at Brymore. With Mr Bagshaw leaving Mr Holt will take over as House Parent in Reid House, where

the boys will gain hugely from Mr Holt's knowledge and enthusiasm for outdoor education and five years' experience as a teacher. We have also taken the opportunity to add an additional member of staff to the boarding team with the appointment of Miss Tatum as the new Boarding Pastoral Manager, who will work across all the houses supporting boys and staff to develop boarding.

Huge efforts by the boys has continued to be put into the development of boarding, by individuals, groups and all three houses as a community. There are individuals who work tirelessly to support their house parent and their boarding brothers ranging from helping individuals with prep, assisting others in organising their dorms to supporting friends through some tough moments such as

homesickness. It is important that there are plenty of opportunities to celebrate success and reward those who have put the extra effort in. 
