## Message from the Headteacher

Brymore has truly got into the Christmas spirit over the past week or so, even down to welcoming unexpected visitors at very short notice. Rather than a couple looking for somewhere to stay, three wise men, some camels and shepherds with their sheep (we already have those) it was in the form of four Ofsted inspectors. Whilst I was pleased with many things that were reported verbally, I was especially pleased that it was business as usual, with the vast range of activities, celebrations and festive events continuing.

We rounded off the showing year with boys and staff attending the Greenslade Taylor Hunt Winter Fair and picking up yet more awards, before attending the gala dinner at Somerset County Cricket club. Boys continued to help out the local community by helping set up the traditional Blackmore by Candlelight event and then attending with our stand, complete with livestock and a blacksmithing demonstration by Mr Weldon. Boys also collected foodstuffs for the local community with the annual 'Smiles for Christmas' campaign. Lieutenant Mark Godwin of the Bridgwater branch of the Salvation Army commented that it was the most he had ever seen with the hamper competition reaching new heights, literally, with an eight foot plus Christmas tree/advent calendar winning the competition for Reid House.

Boys also had the opportunity to do what they do best - eat! There have been cheese and biscuit evenings; some tutors have taken out their group for a meal; Heads of Department were treated to a meal at a local restaurant; Prefects and the Senior Student Leadership Team were taken for a formal meal at Blackmore Farm; there has been Christmas lunch, two Christmas teas including the traditional 'banging the tables' by the Upper School and House Christmas parties with the infamous 'cola cake'.

Sport has continued with rugby fixtures right up until the last few days, finishing with an excellent Year 11 victory over Haygrove. We hosted the Sedgemoor Cross Country Championships, winning the team event, having two individual winners with many boys qualifying for the County Championships in January. Boys wore their Christmas jumpers with style on our Christmas jumper day and Reid House produced my favourite facebook post for some time (please have a look if you have not seen it) with the Reid House Mannequin Challenge, a cracking example of boys and staff working together if ever I saw it.

Finally, yet again Mr Willcocks put on two wonderful Christmas services, preparing boys and staff throughout this busy time. To me they typify Christmas at Brymore. # Horticulture

There has been so much happening this half term that I just don't know where to start!

In lessons we have continued to juice apples, in preparation for the cider which will be ready in the summer. We have had visits from Tony Irons to talk about, and show, how to look after cacti for the Year 8 boys. Alan Down, who is a Brymore old boy running Cleeve Nursery, has written columns for the Western Daily Press and has also had a long running gardening programme on BBC Bristol, talked to Year 9 boys about careers in Horticulture.

We have visited Knightshayes Court (a National Trust property near Tiverton) and had very informative tours around the walled garden with Year 9 boys. A group of Year 8 and another of Year 9 boys went to Cannington Walled Gardens and we also saw their Tilapia project.

Year 7 boys have been to Monkton Elm Garden Centre (near Taunton) to find out about employ-



ment in their line of work; where they get their plants from, the kinds of plants they have and to learn a little about plant breeding too.

In lessons, Year 9 boys have begun the construction of raised beds to ensure we have more plots due to the popularity of them.

A lot of leaves have been collected and piled up to make leaf mould which will be used next year and we have started to dig over the plots and apply farmyard manure and leaf mould. In addition, we have begun winter trimming and pruning.

Duties MUST be completed and any boy who misses without asking permission to be excused will be given a level 2 discipline in the first instance plus a detention and also be expected to make up their day.

Usual reminder that boys MUST bring their kit, which includes warm layers of clothes and wet weather coats and trousers. Too many are coming ill-equipped and then unable to learn because they are cold or getting wet.

## Young Farmers Club



This half term we have again been very lucky to have three speakers.

Mrs Pam Wills from RABI (Royal Agricultural Benevolent Institution) spoke about how the organisation helps the farming community in many different ways and how the money to help them is raised. This gave the boys an opportunity to suggest ways they could help; ideas ranged from an inter-house tractor pull to car washing. One of these ideas will be put into practice in 2017, so look out for that sponsorship form! Three boys and myself attended the Somerset Federation of Young Farmers AGM, held at HQ in Westonzoyland, which has recently had a small stage constructed for just this event.

The following week we were lucky enough to have Richard and Heather Gibson from the charity Aid for Samburu, which they set up after Richard's appearance on the BBC2 documentary 'Toughest Place to Farm'. Richard explained about how the Samburu Tribe are semi nomadic as the young warriors have to move their cattle to where there is grass, when the summer droughts hit their villages. We saw clips of Richard climbing down a 40' well in an attempt to get drinking water, which was none too healthy and the tribesmen initiating Richard into the tribe. Then Richard and Heather spoke about why they set up the charity and how they were working with a country based charity to oversee the construction and maintenance of the waterway they have raised funds for. A well has been dug and the water is carried through pipes for 10km to storage tanks that use gravity to pump the water to taps a mile from the village. This is to prevent the spillage of water around the houses which would turn the ground into mud and attract mosquitos and other pests. A really interesting presentation. Finally, Julie Edwards from Mole Valley Farmers gave another interesting talk on the history of the firm, growing from a small 8 farm co-operative to the 200+ stores that they are now, they are still based in South Moulton where they began. The range of goods and services they supply is quite fascinating. The evening ended with a spirited debate on the effect of Brexit on British farming.

The Cheltenham Science Festival came to the McMillan Theatre of Bridgwater & Taunton College on 1<sup>st</sup> December. An enthusiastic Year 9 attended the event with two one-hour shows dedicated to science. This is becoming a tradition at the Academy as this is our second year of attendance.

After taking their seats, Year 9 saw the first show by Zoé Gamble, which was entitled 'Music to your ears.' In this students were taught about how sound travels through the air and how we hear. This was followed by the technology of sound including how we produce and record sound and manipulate the sounds we hear.

The second show was delivered by Jules Howard entitled 'What might have been: An alternative history of life on Earth.' Students were introduced to the idea of how animals over time have changed shape through evolution and idea of 'survival of the fittest.'



## Sports Report

### *Fitness*

Attendance for fitness remains incredibly high amongst the boarders. A good percentage of out-boarders also attend every session; please can I ask that as many parents as possible support their son by ensuring he is able to attend the session.

### *Cross Country*

In the last week of term the Sedgemoor area cross country trials were held at Brymore. A large number of boys and girls from the Bridgwater area and West Somerset were in attendance. Brymore boys won the Year 8/9 team championship and the Year 10/11 boy's age group was also won by Brymore. Individual winners included Nicholas Payne and Will Jarman. A considerable number of Brymore boys have been selected to represent Sedgemoor in the County Schools Championships in Yeovil on 21st January 2017.

### *Hockey*

The mixed age group hockey squad were hoping to play their first game but this was postponed due to the poor weather conditions. This game will be played in the new year.

### *Rugby*

Numbers of boys training have been good in KS4 and it would be great to see the KS3 numbers increase. All age groups have had a good amount of fixtures and we've had some really good results throughout the year. After Christmas there will be fixtures for all teams. The Year 9s are in the semi-final of the area cup and the Year 10s will hopefully progress to the final of the area cup. The Year 11s have their annual fixture with Shapwick and will hopefully play North Petherton in a flood-lit match at the end of the season. It is important all players remember that to represent the school; Chads Hill and fitness become a prerequisite.

### *Chads Run*

As of writing since September there have been 2,146 Chads Hill Runs, compared to the same time-scale last academic year when 1,476 runs had been completed. Of the 275 boys in school, there are only four who have yet to complete the run and I am pleased to say that every boarder has run it at least once. The senior school totals are very close, with Year 9 completing 500, Year 10 - 443 and Year 11 - 451; the junior school have also done well with Year 7 out-running Year 8 by 28 runs, 390 and 362 respectively. 199 boys have improved their personal best times this term.

Not to be left out, the staff have run 174 times and there have been 8 guest runners.

We have also passed our whole herd TB test. This was sparked off by a neighbour going down with TB. There was initial relief - however since then there have been more reactors in the area. Worrying times.

We have received funding for a reed bed drainage system. 90% of the work has now been carried out with just fencing and the planting of the reeds to take place. Thankfully, all of the work has taken place in the dry weather. The weather has also allowed us to spread a lot of FYM and we still have some yearling cattle out enjoying the outdoor life.

The pig block has yet again come in handy as we have had to house the chickens due to the avian flu scare. We now have some very unhappy chickens.



## South West Winter Fair

Brymore's attendance at the South West Winter Fair has become an annual affair with members of the YFC helping out and some boys showing cattle.

Over the past few years boys have really shown their worth in helping Greenslade Taylor Hunt on the day from moving the sheep and pigs to helping with the turkey carcass judging and carrying the meat. The boys who represented the school this year were no exception in their dedication to show the school off in the best light and staff were rewarded with compliments on their behaviour.
