

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Message from the Headteacher

It is just over a year ago that we were first visited by Ofsted to inspect the boarding provision at Brymore, which then triggered a huge amount of work on policies, paperwork and procedures. Reading through this newsletter makes me proud that whilst staff have worked hard, and we recognise there is still some way to go, the opportunities available to the boys have not diminished, indeed if anything they have increased. This is mainly down to the hard work of staff, but also the continued support of parents and the newly invigorated FOBSA.

The Young Farmers Club offers a range of talks and visits and showing at Brymore is now firmly established. The activity programme continues to expand and diversify, and the programme for next term looks really exciting with visits to Go Ape!, Lock and Code and Aqua Park planned. Boys have had team building with the Royal Marines and The National Citizenship Service, with new ventures such as a debating club also now established. The sports team continue to be successful, with the Year 11 rugby team managing to beat the County Champions in their last ever match and Year 10 being crowned Area Champions after an excellent display against Bridgwater College Academy in the final.

Our Lambing day was a huge success, with over 1,500 visitors attending throughout the day which again was down to the hard work of staff, the support of parents and of course the efforts of the boys themselves. The farm and gardens have increasing numbers of boys showing an interest and continue to offer produce for sale. The governors have established both a farm board and a garden board, where professionals from the associated industries offer support and guidance and plans are underway for further developments in both areas, including, at last, the delivery of a land based qualification that counts in the league tables.

After Easter our thoughts turn to Year 11 and their leaver's service, sports day, the triathlon, swimming gala, attendance at numerous shows, and of course Open Day. We also hold our induction days for the new Year 6 boys who have secured a place at Brymore; where yet again we are the most oversubscribed school in Somerset. The pace at Brymore continues. As a Head I always like my statistics and data: 2,146 Chads runs have been completed so far this year, we had 1,500 visitors on Lambing day, there were over 90 out-boarder applications for 30 places to join the school in September, our English and maths progress results place us in the top 5% of schools nationally, a new Chads record has been set of 9 minutes,52 seconds, Year 10 won the Area rugby final 41-0, over 100 boys have attended every fitness session, over 80 activities are put on each week, 39 Year 11 boys have represented the school at rugby, 117 lambs have been born this year, Year 11 turned a 53-5 defeat by Haygrove in Year 9 into a 33-27 victory in Year 11, we have a showing record of 12 champions, 4 reserve champions and 25 first places, Brymore has over 10 County athletics champions, over 130 parents completed Chads last week and Brymore has one Headteacher who is yet again humbled by the collective effort of all concerned who continue to ensure the boys at Brymore really do get a fantastic experience.

We have tended spring borders and hanging baskets too and are now getting ready for Britain in Bloom displays.

Mr Mahon, a Brymore old boy, who was also groundsman here and is now working as a groundsman at Monkton Coombe School in Bath, gave a great presentation to Year 9 students about his work.

We continue to have the produce and plant sale cart outside the LRC on a Saturday afternoon and all the monies raised go back into the department, so thank you to all that support this. Young Farmers Club

On our first week back, 18 Year 9, 10 & 11s were lucky enough to visit the Robotic Rotary Milker at Worthy Farm Pilton, yes - the very site of the Glastonbury Festival

and our guide was Mr Michael Eavis himself. We saw two stockmen working with the herd, one made sure they moved on to the platform, once on, the cows were secured, scanned, fed and then the clusters attached, if they didn't there was another to fit them manually. The cow then moved sedately around the parlour until they had been milked, where the clamp lifted and they backed out to wander off until the next time. We also had a look at the old parlour, where a small café is planned, the calf shed and a good look out over the site, with the pyramid stage majestic in the middle of a huge field. James Tucker gave the vote of thanks.



Our second meeting of the half term involved a visit from Canine Partners, a UK Charity which trains dogs to assist disable people, they are the dogs that can fill and empty a washing machine, tell their owners that someone is at the door and many other useful skills. The two representatives brought in a young dog who was in early training. It was explained to the boys how they spend 14 weeks with their first trainers then went off for further training at one of two 'colleges', if they were unsuccessful as not every dog is suitable, then sometimes they moved on to a career with the police or the armed forces.

Mr Adamson has been running three Workshops for those boys hoping to represent the school at the Team Challenge at the Royal Bath and West Show in May; these have taken place on the farm during the time allocated for YFC and were for boys from Years 9, 10 & 11.

To avoid a clash with the workshops a one off special was run on a Friday evening when Mr Oliver Mahon, an Old Boy, came to talk about Brymore and Beyond, speaking about his time here at school and how it developed his love of running which he has taken to his current job, as a groundsman at Monkton Combe School in Bath. Mr Mahon organises runs for the pupils on a weekly basis, like our Chads Run for both boys and girls from 4 - 12. He ran the Bath half marathon on the following Sunday in a personal best time. The boys were envious of the different pieces of machinery Mr Mahon had to perform his job, including a tractor that was used only for cleaning the AstroTurf pitch; ride on mowers and white line markers, leaf blowers and tractors and trailers for picking up leafs. Mr Mahon being a true Old Brymore Boy also brought in cakes for the meeting. Ben Trim gave the vote of thanks.

Several members of the group were lucky enough to attend a Training Day at Bagnell Farm in Norton sub Hamdon, where they were shown how to show and clip cattle, they were also given a demonstration on hoof trimming, the cows being hoisted onto their sides for this to take place. Very kindly, all who attended the day were treated to an excellent burger made from meat bred on the farm.

Our last speaker of this half term was Charlotte Scott who spoke to the group about the various competitions run by Somerset YFC they can enter, such as Public Speaking and Debating. (Miss Bradford)

LRC

I am pleased to report that book issues are up on the same time as last year, unfortunately so is the number of overdue books. Please may I make my half termly plea for you to encourage your sons to return any books that they may have.

All the reading books have been catalogued to allow for Accelerated Reading to begin, the next big job will be to 'sticker' them all so that boys will know which books they should be reading to accrue their points. In addition to those already logged, a further 110 books have been added to stock, amongst them the 'Norm' books which are proving popular with those boys who read 'Diary of a Wimpy Kid'.

We have recently donated out of date reference books, old reading books and some books where we have multiple copies to the Harbour Bookshop in Watchet, a charity bookshop that has so far raised over £76,000 for the Cystic Fibrosis Trust and also donated £5,300 to 26 different beneficiaries including their local cricket club (Juniors), Watchet Dementia Alliance and West Somerset Brass Band.

We are currently in the process of revising our library system, in preparation for Accelerated Reader. We will be introducing a fine for overdue books. Before this is put into action there will be an amnesty for all overdue books for the first two weeks back after the Easter Break.

Boxes of Beef

We have boxes of Shorthorn beef for sale. The boxes consist of:

- Family sized joints (silverside and topside)
- Fore Rib and Back Rib
- 3 x 1lb stewing steak
- 3 x 1lb mince
- 2 x rump steak
- 2-4 x sirloin steak
- 1 x fillet

This box will weigh on average 10-13kg of meat and will be sold at £9 per kilo. This is significantly good value particularly for this breed of meat especially one that is grass fed and reared lovingly by the boys and staff here, at Brymore. Sports Report

We must first start with rugby and especially the successful Year 10 team who triumphed over Bridgwater College Academy in the final of the Sedgemoor Area Cup this half term winning 41-0.

Year 11 have played their last rugby match as a team against the area champions, Haygrove, beating them on their own ground. It's been a pleasure having these boys playing rugby for the last few years and helping them develop and I hope many will go on to continue playing. We look forward to seeing who has sustained the effort over the last few weeks in order to get their colours ties at Leavers Service.

House matches have been successful with the senior rugby teams playing their first round matches on Saturday's. In the finals; Walker were winners of the senior rugby and Taylor were victors in the hockey.

We have been successful in cross country recently. A special mention goes to Will Jarman who qualified for the national final, representing Somerset, doing brilliantly at all stages of the qualification process and in the final race as part of the Somerset team. On returning from representing Somerset in the English Schools Cross Country Championship in Norwich Will returned and in the last week of term set two new incredible records. At the Chads Hill run he ran an amazing 9 mins 52 seconds knocking 32 seconds off the previous best time. He then proceeded to decimate the school record for the much shorter run called front drive-back drive. No boy had previously run under 4 minutes however Will managed to run 3 minutes 50.53 seconds. An amazing achievement.

As far as team cross country races have gone we couldn't have imagined the success we have had. We won the Quantock Relay, came 2nd in the Sherborne Trophy and bought home the Clatworthy Mammoth Trophy. I must say a huge well done to all the boys who have pushed themselves to run (in all winds and weathers) from across all year groups for the school.

The after school fitness sessions will finish at the end of this term. Attendance has remained high throughout the winter months for all year groups. Over 100 boys achieved an attendance of 100% and generally the attendance was over 90% throughout this period. The fitness sessions will restart in September 2017.

As of writing since September there has been 2,146 Chads Hill Runs, compared to the same time scale last academic year when 1,476 runs had been completed. Of the 275 boys in school there are 4 who have yet to complete a single loop. The senior school totals are very close, with Year 9 completing 500, Year 10 - 443 and Year 11 - 451; the junior school have also done well with Year 7 out-running Year 8 by 28 runs, 390 and 362 respectively. 199 boys have improved their personal best times this term. Not to be left out, the staff have run 174 times and there have been 8 guest runners.

Whilst talking of the Chads Hill run can I remind parents to drive carefully when approaching the school if the boys are setting off on the run. I am very grateful that some drivers actually stop and wait until the runners have gone past, however some drivers appear to think that it is the boys job to get out of the way. I can assure you that the responsibility lies with the driver. (Mr Spridgens and Mr Williams)





Farm News

Dairy - Since the last report, six of the milking cattle have recently calved, all to Forrester our shorthorn bull. A few weeks before the boys broke up, we turned the cattle out during the day. It was a great sight to see them jumping about, stretching their legs. We have sadly had to say goodbye to Harmony, who was home-bred, born in 2009 and Faithful, who was bought in. On the positive side, the funds raised have gone towards purchasing three in-calf dairy shorthorn cows, two of which are in-calf to sexed dairy shorthorn and three in-calf dairy shorthorn heifers. We are looking to be selling two Holstein second time calvers to go towards the transition of black and white cattle to dairy shorthorn. Also on a positive note, each Al to 100% dairy shorthorn has held and they will be due to calf in the late autumn.

Beef - Crocus and Charlotte's calves are growing nicely and the boys have started halter-breaking them all ready for the show season. Unfortunately, Crocus was PD negative; however it is still early days and she is now running with Forrester. Sheep - The lambing season started very quickly on the return of the boys from their February half-term but this worked well and Year 10 have completed their lambing duties. Also this year we opened the farm to the public for our lambing day. It was a great success seeing over 1,500 visitors come through the farm gates. We had lots of activities including bottle feeding lambs and riding toy tractors. Thanks go to FOBSA who ran the catering, face-paining and raffle stalls. As always there were a few sheep who are late lambing, thankfully not too many and we wait to hear the patter of the last lambs feet soon. The lambing percentage so far is 1.56 with 117 lambs.



Pigs - Shirley has farrowed 10 piglets and Silvia's piglets have now been weaned, are growing nicely and should be ready for Open Day.

Chickens - The chickens are still having to be housed indoors due to the DEFRA guidelines to prevent bird flu. They also gave children the opportunity to incubate their own chicks that have now hatched and returned to Brymore.

In the next few weeks we are going to spread fertiliser on the fields that are stocked. Our silage fields are not going to be fertilised for the first cut. We are seeking how many bales we get from the first cut and then we will see if we need to use fertiliser for the second cut.
