#### **Message from the Headteacher**

The first newsletter of the year always makes me think of three particular groups of boys. The Year 11's who have left us, the current Year 11 who are entering their last year at Brymore and the Year 7 boys who are just starting their journey. Of course it is an important year for all boys, however it is particularly significant for some more than others.

The Year 11's who left us in July have done so having yet again achieved a fantastic set of results. As a group they were amongst some of the highest achieving boys in Somerset with the results in English Literature and Design and Technology yet again being the actual highest. Special mention must go to Sam Tull who got the top grade (9/Distinction\*) in geography, agriculture and horticulture, the second highest grade (8/A) in English, chemistry and DT, with all other subjects at grade 6 or 7. I would also like to highlight Patrick Ruell, who achieved on average three grades higher *per subject* than he was expected to achieve when he joined Brymore. Patrick made some of the best academic progress I have ever seen in my time here. I am proud of what the whole year group achieved and I wish them well with life after Brymore.

The current Year 11 have a lot to live up to especially as they are the first boys who have been with us from the very beginning in Year 7. They have now completed 25 half-terms and only have three 'normal' ones left before the exam season begins. I have spoken to them all in assembly last week and all will have an individual meeting with either Mrs Davis or myself to ensure we are doing every-thing we can to support them.

I have been really impressed with the way the Year 7's have launched themselves into life at Brymore. Their attendance at Chad's and fitness has been good and I am pleased with the application and effort being shown in lessons. With another busy half-term approaching long may this continue.

Thank you to all the parents, friends and family who were able to share the cross country and harvest festival with us last week. I think it makes a huge difference not only to your son, but to the overall ethos of the school and the message that we are sending to the boys. We are in this together, a partnership, where the collective will is so much stronger than that of an individual. I apologise to those parents who had to stand in the lower school service, but I am reluctant to limit those of you who want to bring other family members. We will try, where possible, to increase the seating for the Christmas service.

Thank you also for your patience as we have adapted to the five day week. Without a doubt the vast majority of the feedback has been positive and many have reported enjoying spending family time together at the weekends and taking up old hobbies again. Well done to those who have also had to adapt to being full-time boarders. I was heartened to see a group playing football together one Saturday, that consisted of boys from Year 7 through to Year 11, just like a family should be. Having spent last Saturday evening with the Old Brymorians, who told me they were only allowed home on Sunday afternoon following church, it made me realise that the full-time boarders are indeed pioneers themselves and it is important that we continue to support them.

I hope you all enjoy some family time together over half-term and I look forward to seeing you back after the holidays.

#### Horticulture

As always after a long summer with no boys around we have been busy, busy, busy preparing for the winter. This term has seen a lot of apple crushing, which is always a favourite job amongst the boys. We are selling apple juice, apple and pear and spiced apple too and we will be making cider after the half term.

The beds have been cleared and replanted and the new Year 7s have been given plots and so are busily preparing them.

The broad beans have been sown and some have germinated, perennial and salad seeds have also been sown, pricked out and potted on and some ripe cuttings were taken from some shrubs.

The Cordon apple trees against the wall have been pruned and we have harvested more rhubarb, leeks, potatoes, apples, pears, tomatoes, squash and marrows. Plenty of soil had been served, sterilised and made into our own compost and the winter hanging baskets have been planted. The wildflower area was left to die back and has now been strimmed and tidied up whilst the leaf mold has been put onto some plots as a soil improver and also farmyard manure has been spread.

In class we have looked again at Health and Safety and reminded all the boys of the basic rules and their need to be aware that what they do can have an effect upon themselves, others or the environment.

Our Year 11 boys have been mowing and I must give grateful thanks to HoDs for their hard work during duties. Thanks also go to those boys that are keen to help with the sell-





ing trolley and their enthusiasm is brilliant to see. All of the monies raised goes back into the department so please support us when you collect on a Friday afternoon.

Those Year 8 boys who got 10/10 for each garden duty this term have received certificates and also those who got an average of 9/10 were celebrated too. It is really important that boys turn up for garden duties or let me know so we can swap them and also knowing they can gain these certificates should help improve the standard of work on duties.

The new team of Ms Mitchell, Mrs Meatyard and Miss Gardener are ably supporting in practical lessons and also duties and Friday activities too. Many thanks for their hard work and supportive ideas and commitment to the department.

As we go into the cooler months boys MUST ENSURE that they have wet weather coats available for practical lessons as well as layers of warm clothes to put on when it is cold. Practical lessons do not stop because it is wet or cold. Steel toe capped boots and overalls must be worn to practical lessons and duties, but school uniform MUST be removed first. #### **Young Farmers Club**

The Brymore Young Farmers continues to go from strength to strength with 90 members signed up so far. The usual requirements are in place for those boys wishing to represent the group and of course the school at events or shows. Boys must be a current member of the group, have less than 10 behaviour points and be allowed to miss lessons.

We have been fortunate enough to have had three speakers in this half term, Wendy Welland sharing her collection of animal skulls, which she began whilst at primary school, they ranged from small mammals to large deer.

Julia Birchall-Mann speaking on behalf of BASC, British Association for Shooting and Conversation, explaining what the association is about, what members can expect and why certain restrictions are in place; she was also kind enough to bring in a selection of game recipes, copies of their magazine and instructional leaflets.

Phil Vickery was our last speaker of the half term with a presentation on the Kverneland Group, which is an international agriculture equipment manufacturing company. They are known for de-

veloping, producing, and distributing agricultural machinery and services to the farming community.

We also presented a cheque for £2,500 to Cancer Research, this total was raised by various raffles, a recipe book, and speakers asking for a donation to be made on their behalf and more importantly collecting buckets at every show attended by the school with Mr Adamson dyeing a Kerry Hill ewe pink for each occasion.

We have also attended the Rare Breeds Survival

Trust annual show and sale at Junction 24 in September, the school received a letter of thanks for the work put in by the boys and praising their attitude to work and politeness.

Three boys showed heifers on the Tuesday evening at the Dairy Show at the Bath & West Showground gaining a couple of third placings in highly competitive classes and 20 boys attended the following day at the show proper, they weren't there for a jolly and had to spend a time on the main entrances handing out information on behalf of the organiser's, before being allowed to look around.

Four boys; two Year 10s and two Year 11s gave up their Sunday evening to represent Brymore Academy's membership at the Somerset Young Farmers Harvest Festival Service held at Wells Cathedral and afterwards joined in the Harvest Supper in the Bishops Palace, again not just a jolly but full school uniform to take the outgoing collection at the end of the service.

Our final trip out of this half-term was to The Wilton Sheep Sale in Wiltshire, this was our first time of attending this event and was at the request of a previous chair of Brymore YFC and Head Boy, Charlie Coleman who instigated our attendance. A great day was had by the boys who represented the school, who were worked hard shepherding 3000 sheep from holding pens to auction pen and back again, luckily the weather was in our favour and a good day was had by all. #### **Careers and Work Experience**

Colleges have begun to host their open evenings and taster workshops so please discuss options to visit any your son is interested in visiting with him. As a reminder it is a legal requirement until the age of 18 to do one of the following:

- stay in full-time education, for example at a college
- spend 20 hours or more a week working or volunteering, while in part-time education or training
- start an apprenticeship or traineeship

#### **Farm News**

**Sheep** - During the summer we were lucky enough to have been given a sum of money from the Beltex Sheep Society to purchase a ram. We also bought three pedigree Beltex two tooths of which are hopefully now in lamb. He has also been busy with a group of 30 Suffolk x mules.

Thirty other ewes have been synchronized and mated and all being well lambing at our lambing weekend.

**Dairy** - The cows have recently grazed off a piece of forage rape under sown with Italian rye grass. This was sown as an autumn feed to try and make our winter forage stocks go a little further - job done. The grass is now starting to grow on and may provide something for the store lambs over the winter and then maybe a cut of early silage.

We are mostly milking the black and whites at the moment as the dairy shorthorns are dry and due to calve over the next few weeks. Most are in-calf to dairy shorthorn sexed semen so I am particularly looking forward to rearing them.

We also have some in-calf heifers due to come in along with four bulling heifers to again go to dairy shorthorn semen, some being donated by the Rare Breeds Survival Trust.

**<u>Pigs</u>** - We have just had a litter of ten born. They are pure British Lop Eared as we used semen from Ireland (Bezzural General). We are hoping to sell some for breeding. Artificially inseminating her proved for a couple of interesting lessons!

**Beef** - We are having to sell some of our older store cattle as I am worried about the shortage of winter fodder, and even now I am looking around for different sources. We will keep on the younger animals and the dairy heifers and see what the winter brings. We are able to sell as we have just passed our yearly whole herd tuberculosis test - always a worrying event as many of you will know. (Mr Kingston)

#### Showing

With the end of the year fast approaching we have nearly finished off the summer season of shows and have a few winter ones coming just around the corner. In my last report I finished on mentioning that a few boys have qualified for some competitions. The first qualifier was the RBST Young Shepherd of the Year where Joe,

our Year 10 student had qualified for at Devon the County Show back in the spring. This was held at the Great Yorkshire showground in Harrogate. It was very stiff competition with young handlers travelling from every corner of the country to compete. Joe did ex-



tremely well to make it to the final and came fourth overall in a very hard group at the final. Well done, Joe!

The second young handler qualifier is the Young Shepherd held at the East of England winter festival. Both Harrison and Angus have qualified from the Royal Cornwall Show and we wish them the best of luck.

Going back to the summer shows we attended the Yeovil show. This was a very good show and the boys really enjoyed it. The first classes were continental and Angus had brought his own Beltex sheep along to show under the schools name. He did very well winning the ewe class then going on to take breed champion. The Kerry Hills where placed in the 'any other breed' section but did very well with 20+ in the ring and we gained a 3<sup>rd</sup> with the ram lamb, ewe lamb and ewe. On the Sunday the boys got involved in the fancy dress class that was very amusing to watch; Percy and Joe dressed up as gardeners and flowers and even put a costume on the sheep. The next show was Honiton and this was the first time they held Kerry Hill breed classes and both the boys and I very much enjoyed the show. The day started with young handlers where Harry was placed 3<sup>rd</sup> and Will got a 1<sup>st</sup>. Will then went on to take the overall young handler of the show. After this we started with the breed classes where we had two 1<sup>st</sup> , two 2nd places and one 3<sup>rd</sup>. We finished the



summer shows for the sheep with Dunster. Will again, did very well getting a 3rd in young handlers. We also again did very well in the breed classes with the ewe and ewe lamb both getting 1<sup>st</sup> and the ram lamb getting 2<sup>nd</sup>, the shearling ewe and ram both got 4<sup>th</sup>.

We again attended the Dairy Show but unfortunately did not taking anything in milk as our showing cattle were in calf. We entered two homebred calves that were a year old. Toby and George did all the work behind the scenes with one of them being very stubborn to halter break. The calves are shown on the Tuesday evening with the young handlers starting first. George was in the older class now being sixteen unfortunately he did not get placed but got some great tips from the judge for next time. Toby then went into the next class where he showed himself and the calf off really well and came away with a third. We then moved onto the breed classes with very stiff competition and also being in with other breeds but Toby and George both did very well getting a third in both classes. My thanks go to Miss Bradford as this show would not have been possible without her driving the boys to the show on the Tuesday night and the Wednesday day.

I seem to be finishing my report every year saying the boys have done even better and keep setting the bar higher. Somehow year on year they seem to do it with this year holding the title of team challenge champion. Four boys qualified for national level sheep handling and we had one champion, four 1<sup>st</sup> places, four 2<sup>nd</sup> places and eight 3<sup>rd</sup> places in young handlers. We also had sixteen 1<sup>st</sup> places, eight 2<sup>nd</sup> places and seventeen 3<sup>rd</sup> places in the breed classes.

### **Snowdon Trip**

#### Year 11 ICT


The Year11 imedia ICT exam will take place on 11th January 2019, which is the end of the first week back after Christmas.

#### **English Department**

During the autumn term the English department will once again be participating in the Bookbuzz scheme. Bookbuzz is a reading programme from BookTrust that aims to help

schools inspire a love of reading in Year 7 and 8 students.



Students in Years 7 and 8 have had the opportunity to choose their own book to take home and keep from a list of 17 titles suitable for 11 to 13-year-olds. They are all carefully selected by a panel of experts to ensure quality and suitability. Their selected titles will be arriving after the half-term break; 'Car-Jacked' by Ali Sparkes has been a popular choice. Ask your son which one he has chosen and if they're enjoying it!

This year the English department are working hard to encourage boys in Years 7, 8 and 9 to increase their 'engaged' time when reading. They should all be aiming to read independently for at least 20 minutes a day. In order to inspire them we are offering a number of new incentives as rewards this year. We have individual badges to be earnt for those students who achieve their individualised targets, class competitions in each year group and for the first time ever, Accelerated Reader is now one of the Brymore 'big events' and the house

#### Year 11 Maths

The 'Walk and Talk' maths sessions will be taking place every Thursday evening for our Year 11 boys starting with the first one on 8th November in the hall.

Every Year 11 boy is expected to attend every session from 6.15pm - 7.15pm as this forms a huge foundation in their learning before the exams in the Summer term.

Statistically the boys that have attended every session have improved their overall result by at least half a grade - which has often proved to be the difference between boys not having to re-take at college and having to redo their maths GCSE. (Mr Ashton) who has read the most words at the end of the academic year will receive an extra 500 house points to help them win the house cup.
