Message from the Headteacher

Once again, many thanks to everyone who attended the Christmas Carol Service and I hope it helped put you in the mood for Christmas. As always at Brymore, it has been a very busy week to round off an even busier term. The boys excelled themselves again in collecting foodstuffs for the Smiles for Christmas campaign and in raising money for 'Save the Children' on Christmas Jumper Day and for the Taunton and Bridgwater foodbank, through the retiring collection at the Christmas Carol Service. They were treated to a Christmas lunch, Christmas tea and Christmas parties in the boarding houses.

If you read through this newsletter I think it is amazing that it shows how much has happened in just six weeks. There has been over £1500 raised for various charities, through the Christmas collection, Children in Need, the boarding houses and the work of the Young Farmers Club. Boys again showed their respects on Armistice Day and helped out at the local Blackmore by Candle-light event. Some boys visited the Royal Agricultural University in Cirencester and others were lucky enough to visit Iceland. All of the usual activities have taken place with a special mention to the Year 11 rugby squad for have reached the Area final again where they have the chance of being the first team in my time as Head to win the final two years in a row.

I am also delighted to report that we have been continuing to invest in the grounds and buildings of the school. The main hall has had a facelift, school house dormitories continue to be refurbished, Reid and Kemp common rooms are due next and our new farm building is close to being completed. Brymore is about so many things but the farm continues to be at the heart of what we do which is why I was delighted when we secured such significant funding from the DfE.

I met with the farm team this week as they were planning their holiday working rota. Whilst it is something we see as 'normal' it struck me that there can not be many state schools that have to plan who will be in work on Christmas Day and Boxing Day. I am sure it is something many of you will also be used to. However, I think it helps illustrate the relentless nature of farming. Despite illness, poor weather or public holidays, the cows still need to be milked and the animals fed.

Whatever your circumstances, I hope you do get a chance to spend time with your family this Christmas. This is so important for the boys, especially the full time boarders, as life at Brymore can be so busy that we do not always get the chance to spend time with the people we care about.

Horticulture

Another busy, busy term. We have made cider from some of the cider apples early in the halfterm. Year 7 have visited Monkton Elm Garden Centre, Year 8 Westhay Moor Peat Regeneration Project and Year 9 went to Knightshayes Court to be given an informative guided tour around the walled garden (including lots of the history).

New Year 10 prospective HoDs are being interviewed. Many thanks to the regular HoDs in Year 11, for their help and support.

We have planted bulbs, cleared and re-planted beds of seasonal bedding and autumn/winter hanging baskets have been filled.

We now have a herd of reindeer made by boys and also Christmas wreaths. We also had a Christmas pig too, thanks to one creative student. The two new members of the team, Mrs Osborne and Mrs Franks, who have already made a significant difference, took charge of these livestock and the creation of them!

Beds have been cleared and mulched, more soil from the compost heaps sieved and sterilised. Potted plants have been trimmed and weeded and then top-dressed and the polytunnel emptied so that the floor can be repaired.

As always, my sincere thanks to Mrs Stanley for all her help. She heads up Plots Club on a Tuesday evening and we regularly get a small number of students who need extra help on their plots.

As yet, the wall has not been re-built but the roll up doors we put onto the potting shed have made a considerable difference, especially in the colder evenings for garden duties. Just a reminder: **ALL** Year 8 boys should be completing an hour of garden duties per week. Some have now accrued several nights to be made up. Also, boots **must** have steel toe caps, overalls **must** be worn and old clothes/PE kit put on **under** their overalls. (Mr Willcocks)


Boys and staff managed to raise an outstanding £735.95 for the charity, so thank you to all the boys, staff and parents for

The cows have now gone into the new milking parlour and their first milking went very well, considering the new routine they faced. From then on, it seems literally a dream to milk in.

We have had two recent calvings - one bull calf (Dairy Shorthorn) and one 100% Diary Shorthorn heifer.

The Ewes have recently been scanned. I am reasonably happy with them being scanned to 162%.

We are carrying 19 store lambs through to the new year.

Most of the cattle are in, apart from the last few in-calf heifers, store cattle and dry cows.

The turkeys reared and sold very well. I continue to be impressed with how the Year 10 boys take care when plucking and dressing the birds. (Mr Kingston)



Remembrance

Remembrance Day was honoured by the boys, Old Brymorians and staff at Brymore as they lined the main drive on Armistice Day.

The day began with an assembly led by Private Barry Lockyer, a parent and ex-Brymore boy, who gave a heart-warming speech in which he talked about the impact of active service on veterans and not only the importance of remembering those lost but also of caring for the mental health of survivors.

At 11.00 am as the school clock ceased its chimes the whole school held two minutes of silence before the Last Post was played. Mr Thomas read a poignant passage to everyone before the procession

led by Head Boy and Deputy Head Boy carrying wreaths and flanked by Assistant Head Boys moved slowly to the front of school house, where the wreath was placed in memory of all who have lost their lives over the last 100 years. The procession was then joined by Private Lockyer and Mr Carr, also a current parent and former member of the Armed Forces. Both men wore their uniforms. Iceland

An Iceland first... walking on a glacier. Wow!

Voted the best excursion during our five day trip during the October half-term holiday, both boys and staff couldn't stop talking about how good it was. Our guided tour started with getting kitted out with helmets, walking sticks and crampons... but that wasn't the funniest part...as we drew near to the glacier it was time to attach crampons to boots which proved very entertaining, watching some struggle to figure out how exactly the strapping actually worked! So... crampons on, helmets on and walking sticks at the ready, our three expert and friendly guides led us into a crevasse...an icy cavern with amazing patterns and colours... before leading us up and onto the top of Sólheimajökull glacier. The views from the top were simply spectacular, both down the valley and towards the snout but also back up towards the top of the icecap... which at its deepest measured approximately 700 metres. Where we stood still had a colossal depth of 180m to the valley floor. After over two hours on the ice we came back down, filled with awe and enthusiasm from our experience.

We also managed to conquer Eldfell volcano for the first time, having had our two previous attempts scuppered by poor weather... which almost defeated us again. However, having trekked to within striking distance of the 200m summit, powerful winds giving us a facenumbing wind-chill temperature of -7 meant 10 minutes at the top was more than enough. Fortunately it was well worth it as we were rewarded with stunning views back to the mainland of Iceland, on the clearest of sunny days... well worth the effort!! We then topped Heimaey island off with a visit to the local swimming pool...a naturally heated geothermal outdoor pool with hot tubs, a cold tub (that was visited by several mad pupils... and a few more than once) plus a great slide.

Speaking of naturally heated pools, this time around we visited the geothermal pool called the Secret Lagoon and in many ways, it was much better than its larger and more famous cousin, the Blue Lagoon. Here, the Secret Lagoon was located in a quieter location, away from the masses of tourists that now swamp the other one. The waters were still a balmy 38-40 °C and offered the luxury of relaxing up to your neck with just your head keeping cool in the cold air. The setting was beautiful and it was a perfect way to unwind for an hour-and-a -half!

The remainder of the trip was filled with looking at stunning waterfalls containing landscapes covered by their frozen spray, Strokkur geysir erupting every 10 minutes and vistas that left the mouth wide open. I hope the trip will live long in the memory for all that came along. I would like to say a huge thank you to all parents and guardians for helping to make this trip a success and I wish everyone a fantastic Christmas. Sports News

In rugby the Year 11 semi-final of the County Cup versus Kingsmead is scheduled to be played here during the first week back after the holidays. The Year 11 boys also feature in the area finals against Haygrove at North Petherton Rugby Club on the 16th January which, if they win, will be a great success for them. In addition our Year 10 team have made it through to the area final at Bridgwater and Albion Rugby Club on Monday 13th January. All these dates are provisional and pitch inspection dependent but I'm sure all of the players would value a crowd to lift them on the night so supporters very welcome. Fixtures continue after Christmas for all age groups and we are building towards house rugby fixtures after the next half term. Everyone is welcome to rugby training and certainly in the Year 7 and 10 groups we could use a few more coming out to training.

The area cross country trials were held here during the last week of term and the Year 11 team (made up of all rugby players so just emphasising the sheer determination and fitness of the sport) won the inter boys contest and approximately 20 boys have qualified for the county trials in late January in Yeovil. The trials fall on a Saturday so I would be heartened to see lots of parents encourage their sons to ensure they take part.

We attended a "Step into sport" conference in Yeovil hosted by SASP and Paralympian Kate Gray, with 12 boys learning new ways of delivering sport to others. Coming up next term, we are also taking part in a table cricket competition at the County Ground in Taunton and we will be attending the Boccia area championships, so there is lots for boys to get involved in.

Numbers attending Chads every day continue to be good and those boys running it are really seeing a change in their overall fitness, so if your son struggles to see the run as important, then please encourage them, as it really does benefit their overall health. (Mr Williams)

Design Technology

Our Year 11s are getting ready to make their final project. The projects have been designed, modelled and developed now and students need to have ordered their materials ready to start making first day back.

Students are designing for a special event or occasion for their major project. Some of the more ambitious designs include showboxes, folding benches, display stands and drinks tables with built in ice packs. For many it will be the biggest project they have ever made.

"Spring term is loads of fun in the department." said Mr Austin, Head of DT, "It's great to be able to help our Y11s make some real projects but it does get busy! It's really important that students have all their materials in for the first day of term and it's very helpful if parent/guardians can make sure their sons have everything they need in school on the first day of term."

Many pupils are now designing on the computer using our CAD programmes. Using computers to model their designs is a great step forward for our boys and shows that they can embrace modern methods of designing. For Year 11 CAD strengthens their design portfolio and will make a difference to their grades.

Pupils are introduced to CAD programmes including 2D design and Sketchup from Y7 onwards. We find that the lower school are quick to take on the new skills needed. These skills are then developed through to GCSE level.

Sketchup is a free programme and boys are encouraged to download it onto their own computers to help them build their skills. The picture illustrates a showbox designed by Year 11 Louis Bagg. (Mr Armstrong)

Boarding



Mentoring is a real strength at Brymore with older boys supporting younger years with their homesickness, encouraging activity participation and checking in and out with them. The House Improvement Team consists of boys who represent each boarding house. Many hoodies have been ordered with a small profit being added to the HIT budget. With their respective budgets for each house much provision and equipment for the enjoyment of both boarders and out boarders has been purchased. Reid House for example has had a new PS4 and boys have enjoyed playing with this. Our activities budget has bought new sports equipment too.
