

Message from the Headteacher

Much has been written about the new farm building elsewhere in this newsletter however, for me it has to be the highlight of this half-term. Indeed it is one of the most important events since I became the Headteacher of Brymore nearly ten years ago.

When I first joined the school I was taken aback by the sheer passion the boys, staff, parents and community had for the school and the farm was very much at the heart of this. People were understandably wary of the new Head and I was regularly grilled about my intentions for the farm. At a time of financial vulnerability there were genuine concerns that I had plans to close the farm or even sell it off. Nothing could have been further from the truth and I quickly realised the importance of the four cornerstones of the farm, gardens, workshops and sport to the very essence of what Brymore is all about. It is what makes us different, indeed unique and the farm is an essential element in building a 'Brymore boy.'

The purpose-built milking parlour was designed with teaching the boys in mind, along with the ability to observe what is happening from the classroom next door through one of the first interactive displays of its kind to be installed in the country. The building also houses a dedicated classroom for agriculture and land based studies, which means that theory lessons can actually happen on the farm. The investment continues with the purchase of a cattle bolus to allow real time tracking and analytics which the boys can access through their mobile phone. There are also plans for a new general purpose barn, pig housing, specialist chicken housing and the resurfacing of the yard area. Along with the recent refurbishment of the horticultural area and potting sheds, this means over £750 000 will have been spent on land based studies over the past few years. This is why the new farm building is so important. It is a statement of intent of how vital we see our role is, in developing the workers for the land based industry of tomorrow, as well as the importance of the farm to Brymore itself.

What better way to teach the values of resilience, resourcefulness and responsibility and to instil the sense of 'Diligentia et Labore' than through the working of the land? So, whilst the new building is now finished and a new chapter in the history of Brymore has started, the hard work will continue. Hard work by myself and other staff in ensuring the investment continues and hard work by the boys themselves, in continuing to help run the farm just as generations of Brymore boys have done before them.

Horticulture

Once again this has been a busy term, but isn't each one in its own way?

Many thanks to the team who are establishing themselves now. Mrs Stanley continues to keep us organised on the practical side and she is now ably assisted by Mrs Franks and Mrs Osborne (two days per week), both of whom help in the classroom too. Mrs Franks is having a very positive effect upon the classroom displays, thank you.

In the gardens we have pruned back, weeded and mulched with woodchip, a number of the beds and borders. We have started pruning the soft fruit bushes and the apple trees and brought leaf mold up to the walled garden for use as a soil improver and crop nourisher on the vegetable beds.

Seeds have been sown by the Year 7s. We have been amazed at how quickly they have germinated and started to grow, and some of the seedlings have been pricked out, with varying degrees of success! This is such a delicate job which some boys find very challenging.

We have taken hardwood cuttings from rambler roses and cornus (dogwood), pruned and top dressed plants in the sales area, trimmed or cut back roses and grasses and generally tried to keep the department tidy. We have the early potatoes chitting, ready for planting next term and the tete-a-tete daffodils which we planted just before the end of last term have begun to flower.

The new raised bed outside Reid House has now been refilled with soil from the compost heap and will be planted up next term. Cider vinegar continues to be bottled although the apple juice is now all sold.

Young Farmers Club

We were lucky this half-term to be offered two CPR and Basic First Aid evenings for the older boys; with farming suffering the highest amount of fatalities and injuries in the UK each year for the last 20. This is something that is important for the boys to learn.

The nine boys who took the CPR evening learned about when to apply CPR, how to carry it out correctly and what else they should do before and after carrying out the procedure.

The follow up session two weeks later was affected by the Year 11 Rugby finals, when four boys chose to watch - Brymore won, so it was worth it. The five boys who did attend the second session learnt about bandaging different injuries and dealing with shock. A big thank you to Andree and Charley Chandler for organising and delivering the two sessions.

In between these two sessions, Innes Findlay from BASC came in and held a very successful back-to-back Electronic Shooting hour, the juniors were from 6.15pm - 7.15pm and seniors from 7.15pm - 8.45pm. The boys shot in pairs at realistic projected pheasants, grouse, partridge and ducks, having a couple of rounds at each target, using a shot gun or rifle and then swapping. The junior session was won by our youngest member 10 year old Jacob. The winner of the senior session was won by Jed.





The next session was with two Police Community Officers, who spoke about why they became officers, how long the training was and the sort of incidents they attended; the boys asked many and varied questions which were answered truthfully and in a way the boys understood.

Our penultimate session was the showing of a new copy of Silence at Ramscliffe, about the Foot and Mouth epidemic that hit the UK in 2001, this showing was made all the more poignant, with the attendance of Tom, whose father owns the farm in the DVD and who hopes to take over when the running of the farm when qualified. Although not yet born when the disease struck, Tom spoke about the effect it had on his family.

The final evening was with Mrs Wendy Welland, showing another string to her bow and an evening of carding lambs fleeces and spinning the carded wool. (Miss Bradford)

Ten Tors

New Farm Building

Rugby World Cup winner Phil Vickery did the honours of opening our brand new £600,000 farm building and spoke with passion about his background in farming and how the relentlessness of it helped form his career as a professional sportsman.

The former England star - and winner of Celebrity Masterchef - was shown round the school by the Brymore boys and spoke to staff and guests before unveiling a plaque.

Mr Vickery's nephew attends Brymore, Year 10 Ethan, and the rugby star said he had seen how the school had given him a sense of belonging and purpose during his education.

Phil spoke of his ties to the farming community, having grown up on a dairy farm and remains a qualified cattle inseminator, and how he still feels close to his roots. Even mentioning how the Schools' one acre walled garden bought back happy memories of his grandfather's own garden from his youth – a nod to the holistic approach to land based that Brymore teaches.

"I think it is fantastic the boys here have access to a facility like this - not everyone thrives in a purely academic background so it is important we give our young people a variety of opportunities," Phil said.

"Having been shown around today, having been greeted with welcoming handshakes and smiles by all the boys, and knowing the effect this school has had on Ethan, I will leave here today feeling inspired."

The new building gained funding from the Department For Education, and an additional £100,000 from the Bridgwater and Taunton College Trust will assist with an additional purpose built farm building the school is hopeful can be erected soon.

Mr Thomas spoke passionately about the school, his staff and the Brymore boys that attend now and those that have also gained from the school in the past. Guests from all walks of the agriculture industry, from The NFU through to Mole Valley, the Shorthorn Society and the Bath and West Show Society, along with the local MP and the Deputy Lord-Lieutenants mingled with some of the first ever Brymore students who attended back in 1952.

Mr Thomas said "The building has very much been needed by our farm, and we are delighted with the end result which includes a classroom and a new milking parlour. Agriculture is at the heart of what we do and this building is a real statement of intent for us as a school."

Mr Thomas thanked the board of governors, the staff and students, Bridgwater College Trust, the neighbouring farmers, the parents and Friends of Brymore Association, Bridgwater Agricultural Society, the MP and EDF. (Ms Warren)
