

## Message from the Headteacher

The first half term is always a busy one at Brymore however, it has seemed especially so this year as we have started to return to a more normal way of working. It was great to see so many parents at both Harvest Festival services and the Cross-Country Championships. I think being able to welcome parents and their families back into Brymore, so that we can work together more effectively, has been one of the most important changes for this year and something we have missed over the past 18 months.

I started the year by telling the Year 11s, and the prefects and the Senior Student Leadership team in particular, that I expected them to help lead the younger boys and model what it is like to be a Brymore boy. They have certainly done this, and I have been proud of the way that they have responded to this challenge. Whilst the bubble system was needed to try and limit the potential spread of Covid, it did mean that the younger boys did not have much contact with the older boys and therefore did not have many opportunities to learn from them. It has been a real pleasure to see this happening this term as we work hard to re-introduce the Brymore ethos and traditions.

Sadly, we were not able to hold a hog roast for the Year 7 families last year which is a chance for parents to raise any concerns at the end of the first week. We did have one this year and I hope it helped the Year 7 families and boys immediately feel part of Brymore. I have been really impressed with the number of rugby fixtures fulfilled already this year and it was fantastic to see all five year groups represented at Queens College last Saturday, with lots of parents and staff also in attendance to support the boys.

I would like to thank everyone who has been involved and has been supportive of the testing and vaccination arrangements. I realise this is very much a personal decision, but it is still a huge task to organise, and in the case of vaccinations, at very short notice. Fortunately, cases at Brymore remain very low compared to other schools and we have been able to continue to run activities and fixtures as normal. The status of the school is continually reviewed and all schools in Somerset are placed in either, blue, amber, or red status. If schools move into amber status, then fixtures and whole school events will need to be cancelled. At the time of writing, we have recently come out of blue status, which means we can continue to operate as normal.

I am pleased to report the work on the swimming pool has started and it is on target to re-open after Easter. The total investment is over £300,000 and includes a new heating system. It means we will be able to end the year with the swimming gala, another key event which we have been unable to run over the past couple of years.

Finally, I am looking forward to welcoming back the Year 11 boys who left in 2020 at such short notice as we went into the first lockdown. We intend to hold their leavers service in November and preparations are well underway.

I am aware that this half term holiday is a busy time for many of you as we approach harvest time. However, I do hope you manage to spend some time together as a family and I look forward to seeing the boys back after half term.

## **Boarding**

It has been a busy but yet enjoyable return to 'normal' boarding at Brymore, after what has been a disrupted and different boarding experience for all the boys over the past 18 months. Boys have returned from the summer holidays full of energy and spirit and got back into the swing of boarding very quickly, enjoying all the benefits of their boarding experiences which Years 8s and 7s had yet to fully have.

All three houses have been busy and full of life, none more so than Kemp and Reid who have welcomed the new Year 7s into the houses who have taken to Brymore and boarding like ducks to water. The energy (and volume) levels within the houses have certainly been turned up with the Year 7s arrival, who have been fortunate enough to experience the houses without bubbles and restrictions on activities and social spaces, which has enabled them to become fully part of the Brymore community within days of becoming Brymore boys. The two-week induction program into boarding has had a very positive impact on new boys to boarding with feedback from individuals such as 'I loved my first few weeks, everyone has helped me settle in and have been very kind' and 'I've made loads of friends and the staff are very friendly and helpful'. Boys have really thrown themselves into Brymore life with a very high uptake in extra curricular activities, which has even resulted in the house being nearly empty of boys at times after school as they are out enjoying the wide range of activities on offer to them.

All three houses have begun the year in a positive way by thinking and supporting others around them and in the wider community, with the mentoring program in place to support all younger boys in the houses, whilst each house also pressing forwards with their charity work and fund-raising efforts. Reid house have begun their support of Cancer research with a challenging task of running from Lands End to John O' Groats (874 miles) which is to be shared out to all boys within the house running 10 Chads Hill

runs each before the Christmas holidays. School house also took on a physical challenge replicating the feat of some of the boys from the house who climbed Snowdon during the half term, by ascending and descending the fire escape and internal staircase 36 times each, which replicated the meters climbed by those on Snowdon, raising over £500 in one evening's work for their charity Farmer Community Network.

Boys who have stayed in over the weekends have had the opportunity to take part in a number of onsite activities, whilst also enjoying time off-site with trips put to 10-pin bowling, banger racing championships, Timewarp Arcade, Weston Helicopter Museum, ploughing match and the cinema to watch the new James Bond movie. Feedback from boys at the end of the summer term has seen a continued investment in new equipment for activities, with boarding purchasing new BMX bike, darts board, long range walkie talkies for man hunt, range of new sporting equipment and games equipment for the house to encourage social interactions and a family / community feel.

It's been an impressive start to the academic year by all, and staff have commented on how well boys have settled back into the routines and expectations of Brymore. Well done all and keep it going into the winter months!





### **Farm**

We have fired the parlour back up!!! We started calving on 22<sup>nd</sup> September so we have now got 10 cows back in milk, with the odd few that didn't hold to first service left to calf in the coming weeks. We are now selling our milk to Barbers so next time you buy some cheese you could be eating cheese made using milk from our own cows. We even featured in their newsletter this month. We passed the TB test for the year and purchased two new freshly calved dairy shorthorn heifers to join our herd.



This year we will have the opportunity to offer beef shorthorn beef boxes at the end of next term if there is enough interest, so please register any interest to Miss Parker.

It is that time of year again and our rams have gone back in with the ewes so that we can start lambing in March and hopefully everything permitting, we will finally be able to host our lambing day again. We have been working closely with the Devon Closewool Sheep Society and have purchased our showing starter flock of 10 ewes. We have, by very kind permission, borrowed a lovely Devon Closewool Ram for this year from an ex Brymore student from 60 years ago.

Some of you may have already had a sample taster of our pigs at the Year 7 hog roast, that we provided the pigs for this year. If you enjoyed this, then you may want to think about purchasing some of our pork produce that will be available at the end of next term.

Our chickens are still laying well and eggs, as always, are available at Brymore Lodge priced at £1 per ½ dozen. Our light Sussex and speckled Sussex chicks that we hatched ourselves are growing well and we will have free range meat chickens available to buy as an alternative to turkey this Christmas. As always we have a limited amount of turkeys available to purchase this Christmas. They will be table ready and frozen due to term times.

The Year 9s are currently weighing and recording calf weights every week, so they can calculate their daily liveweight gain in order to help them achieve their BTEC certificate by the end of the year. Their first assignment is due in on the 15<sup>th</sup> October 2021.

Back in July we entered the school farms network annual awards. The then Year 8s recorded a short video of Brymore Farm, which we won our class and received our trophy. We also came in third place for best use of a school farm during the pandemic. ### Horticulture

Why is it that weeds grow so well and our crops struggle?

Over the summer whilst Mrs Stanley and Mrs Osborne were busy picking fruit and vegetables and providing plants for the stall at the Lodge (thank you to Mrs Kingston for overseeing that and for the support we have had from local residents), the weeds have been developing and taking over the plots and the borders, but with the return of the boys and the start of Year 8 Garden Duties we have reclaimed lost territories. The wildflower area (to be resown in the spring) has been attacked and we can now see the apple trees there. The flower borders have been cleared of bindweed and the pots in the polytunnel and sales area are now considerably tidier.

Many thanks to the HoDs who have taken groups of boys in the evenings to help keep the department tidy, and provide a fresh supply of sieved soil for the steriliser so that we can make up our own compost.

We have now begun apple juicing in lessons, an activity which generates a lot of enthusiasm. The taste testing session always goes down particularly well. We will continue after half term with the cider apples and other later varieties.

Flower arrangements have been produced for the Open Mornings and Harvest Festival, spring bedding has been potted up, as we plan for Cannington in Bloom 2022 and we have received the exciting news that once again, Cannington received a Gold Certificate for their entry this year and Brymore had a special mention in the judges comments. We produced all the plants, planted up the baskets which were seen throughout the village and also Mrs Stanley worked with the committee advising and helping.

The boys' plots have now been re-allocated so where there were vacant plots, Year 7s have now enthusiastically started the work of preparing the soil ready for planting with broad beans or onions, or leaving it with leaf mulch on the top to breakdown and provide structure and nutrition for next years' crops.

Preparation is under way for trips next term and

so any Year 7 or 8 parents who have not yet responded to the horticultural letter referring to support for those trips are kindly reminded to do so. The Year 10 and 11 students are continuing with the Horticultural Skills Award in their practical lessons and many are well on their way to achieving the Certificate (comparable to Merit status) and a few towards the Diploma (Distinction level).

The photo competition continues and so we are at present looking for entries for this month, Horticulture in Brymore in October. There are prizes for those who win and we will compile another Calendar for next year featuring the winning photographs. This will be available in time for Christmas. A good present solution for all those grandparents and Aunts and Uncles that so often cause a headache!

There is never any slow time in this department but being outside with the birds, the sunshine, the leaves turning colour (take note of the Liquid Amber trees (Liquidambar styraciflua) outside Room 8, as their leaves turn colour and the harvest is calming for the soul and refreshing for the spirit. You should all take some time outside in nature or in your own garden this half term. (Mr Willcocks)

Throughout the academic year we provide additional careers events and activities for boys across all age groups that will give them a clearer idea of the routes to further education, training and jobs that they will find engaging and rewarding.

Our Careers programme is regularly updated and informed by the boy's requests and needs, and includes:

- Careers conventions (goals and aspirations day)
- HE and FE insight events and taster days
- Business and employer talks (Careers Breakfasts)
- Employability workshops (CV building, personal; presentation skills etc)
- Mock interviews
- **Drop in Career Clinics**
- Assemblies from employers, colleges ad training providers
- Networking opportunities with alumni
- Apprenticeship information

Our inaugural Careers Breakfast was held early this term with a Wessex Water Apprentice. Over 20 boys chose to attend to learn more about this training option and ask questions...aided by the lure of juice and croissants! Every Year 11 boy has had the opportunity to have an individual 1-1 careers interview with a specialist from outside the school, a great thing for them and hopefully insightful too.

We aim to keep parents and carers informed of our careers provision via parent bulletins and our dedicated Careers web page that signposts pupils and parents to further information and external links.

Every boy also has the opportunity for a career guidance session with myself, a Level 6 qualified careers adviser, and Bridgwater and Taunton College Trust Careers Leader.
