Message from the Headteacher

As we come to the end of what has felt like a particularly long half term once again, I find myself reflecting on the hard work that everyone has put in. Year 11, in particular, have responded well to the demands being asked of them, with many days starting with a 45-minute breakfast session before school, then six hours of lessons, before over an hour of additional English or maths after school. It has been relentless, but the resilience instilled in them over the years has begun to seriously pay off.

Staff of course have played their part, not only in delivering these sessions but also by ensuring all of the other activities have continued, despite higher than usual levels of staff absence due to Covid. We have not had to send year groups home as has been the case in many other schools, as all staff have continued to support and cover each other during this time. I think everyone deserves a good rest over the half term break.

I am delighted that we will be able to open the swimming pool soon following its refurbishment and the installation of a new heating system. We are currently waiting for staff to complete the relevant training and of course for the weather to warm up. Sadly, we have had to close the library building due to issues with the roof. We have re-located the books temporarily whilst we explore the feasibility of building a replacement. However, I am pleased that boys have continued to work on their reading as it was something that appeared to have dropped during lockdown.

Year 6 parents will soon be finding out if their son has been successful in obtaining a place at Brymore. We are in the fortunate position of still being the most over-subscribed school in the County and we will have a waiting list for both day and boarder places. Whilst this is good news for the school, it is of course disappointing for those that are unsuccessful. For those that are successful, we look forward to welcoming them into the Brymore family soon.

I hope everyone manages to spend some quality time with their family over half term and I look forward to seeing the boys when they come back after their well deserved break.

Boarding

Boarding continues to look at how we can make the experience of the boys more enjoyable and the boys' input in this is vital. The House Improvement Team (HIT) allows boys to meet and talk about how they can improve the equipment and decor within the houses. Since Christmas, Reid House has invested in gym equipment and lighting as well as craft materials, new Lego sets, a new oak dining table, a range of new PS4 games, a new TV surround sound system and star and solar system mood lighting. Kemp has bought some more lighting and toys. School House has got some new pool cues and tips, as well as the new Farming SIM 2022 game, new framing and décor for the back stair cases, like Reid House. Boys from all houses have made further suggestions to expand the range of on-site activities available and I am currently costing up and looking into purchasing a new range of outdoor off road RC cars, and also purchasing a number of stunt scooters and ramps, based on boys suggestions to what they would enjoy doing.

We invested in some new monster construction RC vehicles for all houses to book out and use. An excavator, dump truck and hopper truck as well as a low loader, have been bought and many boys have used these already - they are a big success. Young and old, working together to transport mini logs and dump sacks has been fun!

Boys who started this year are well and truly settled and should be getting the most out of their experience here at Brymore. Certainly, the staff are constantly encouraging boys to get stuck in and get involved. It is the best way to overcome homesickness.

Year 7s have been learning about toxic masculinity and the 'Everyone's Invited' cause. This is part of their 'Respect for all' Personal Support Workshop unit of education during prep. Year 8s and 9s are finding their rhythm again after two lockdowns in their experience of schooling so far and are doing well considering. Year 10s and 11s are working hard towards their results and futures moving forward with Year 11s focusing on their final lap and terminal exams, as well as coursework deadlines.

Regarding charity events, School House will be holding a pudding night next month where boys can buy a pudding for £2. Kemp older boys will be invited up to the House as part of their transition later this year. School House's charity is the Farming Community Network. Reid House has sent letters out encouraging boys to do a sponsored event of totalling up their Chads runs to total the distance from Lands End to John O'Groats. Their charity is Cancer Research. Kemp House's charity is the WWF. Boys have chosen an endangered animal to sponsor and each dorm, (14), will have their own animal. They will get a plush toy and news updates about their adopted animal.

With regret we have to say goodbye to a long serving member of the boarding staff. Mrs Long leaves us and moves onto pastures new. The boys held a party in Reid to give their houseparent a royal send off! Mrs Long dedicated over five years of her life to the cause of making sure the boys under her care had the best possible experience and is the founder of our inaugural full time boarding house. We wish her every success in her life moving forward. We have appointed a new matron who has been with us sev-

eral weeks now and we welcome Matron Keattch to the team.

As the days get longer, we welcome the news that the swimming



pool should finish ahead of time, which will be an

exciting addition to the school and just in time for the summer months to come later this year. Boarding have missed the pool as it was always nice on a hot

Farm

Sheep:

The ewes are now safely in our lambing shed ready for lambing, due 7th March. We are looking forward to welcoming the public into the farm to our Lambing Day on 19th March from 10.30am - 3.00pm. Hopefully there will be lots of lambs on the ground for people to see and bottle feed.

Cattle:

We have sold some of our finished beef animals in the last couple of weeks and Mr Kingston was able to take some of the Year 9 boys to the market to help unload them and have a quick look around at the stock up for sale. The calves have settled into the beef shed, having been weaned, and are making good weight gains.

The dairy cows continue to milk well, and we are happy that everything is back in calf to continue our new block calving system which seems to be working well for us.

Pigs:

Our two litters have been growing on well. The Year 8 students have been monitoring their daily live weight gain. They have been causing havoc exploring the farm as free range piglets so we have now had to alter the pen to keep them in until weaning. We have some finished pigs ready to go and we will be offering sausages and a hog roast at the Lambing Day. We will have additional sausages available to purchase as well, please just get in touch if you are interested.

Curriculum:

Year 7 and been looking at animal welfare and notifiable diseases this term. Year 8 have been looking at beef production and monitoring daily live weight gains. Year 9 students have been

busy completing their BTEC practical assignments. They have also completed the second beef and dairy written assignment. Year 10 are in the middle of completing their Synoptic Coursework for Land Based studies with practical assessments in the gardens and on the farm. They also have a 2,000 word assignment to complete by the 11th March. (Miss Marks)

Bee Club

Bee Club has continued this term and a few boys have been going to Spaxton Apiary where they have cleaned and prepared hives, learnt how to heft the hives (lifting them to weigh them) to see if more food is needed, made beeswax candles and foundation sheets and learnt more about the verroa mite and the foulbrood disease. We do not open the hives at this point because the change in temperature would kill many bees and we will continue after half term, every other Monday evening to learn more about Beekeeping. Horticulture

Work carries on in the Horti department with pruning and tidying up being the focus. In the walled garden the cordon trained apple tree on the west wall has been pruned back, along with the gooseberry and blackcurrant bushes. The raspberry canes have been trimmed and tied up, after the wires were re-straightened, posts renewed and rogue plants dug up and replanted back into the line. In the central soft fruit area, some bushes have been removed, replaced by raspberry canes and the area weeded, dug over and new Mypex (a ground cover fabric) has been replaced. In the cut flower area in the walled garden, construction of new raised beds has been completed and replanting continues. The Year 7s have been taught about single digging and many are trying it out on their own plots. The plots are generally looking much better although there will be some boys who need to get their soil prepared, otherwise they will be delayed when it comes to planting. Mrs Stanley will be marking the plots at half term.

The herbaceous border on the south side of the walled garden has been cleared and prepared and has now been replanted with an underplanting of bulbs and various herbaceous perennials. There is a new garden being created in the same area, which will become a garden for HoDs to relax in at lunch time. There will be willow fencing and various herbs planted in the area along with a new bench, made from recycled plastic.

The HoDs are doing a fantastic job in the evenings and we are really getting a lot of work done by the Year 8s. We are truly very grateful to these boys for all they do, as our department would not be able to function without this extra help.

We miss the help of the Year 11s as many of them now use the horticulture lessons to revise. We do hope that they will find the time to complete the necessary assessments so that they can achieve their Horticultural Skills qualification. The raised beds outside of the boarding houses are now being replanted, having been topped up with compost and then had bark chip spread on the soil surface. The area looks so much better and we are so grateful for all the hard work and expertise of the site team, who this half term have also reconstructed out top compost heap. Thank you.

The sales cart is out every Friday evening with produce and plants so please do drop by and see what we have for sale. All the sales support the practical side of the department. We also encourage you to walk around our sales area where you may find just the plant you need to fill that gap in your garden.

In class we have had some lively discussion with the Year 8s, as we consider more environmentally friendly methods of gardening and farming and the Year 9s have been studying life cycles and seed production. Who knew that the development of new varieties was so complicated? The Green Planet has been very apposite with the teaching and is well worth a watch if you have missed the series.

Once again, I have to thank the team for all they do day by day and to remind you all that your custom is much appreciated. (Mr Willcocks)
