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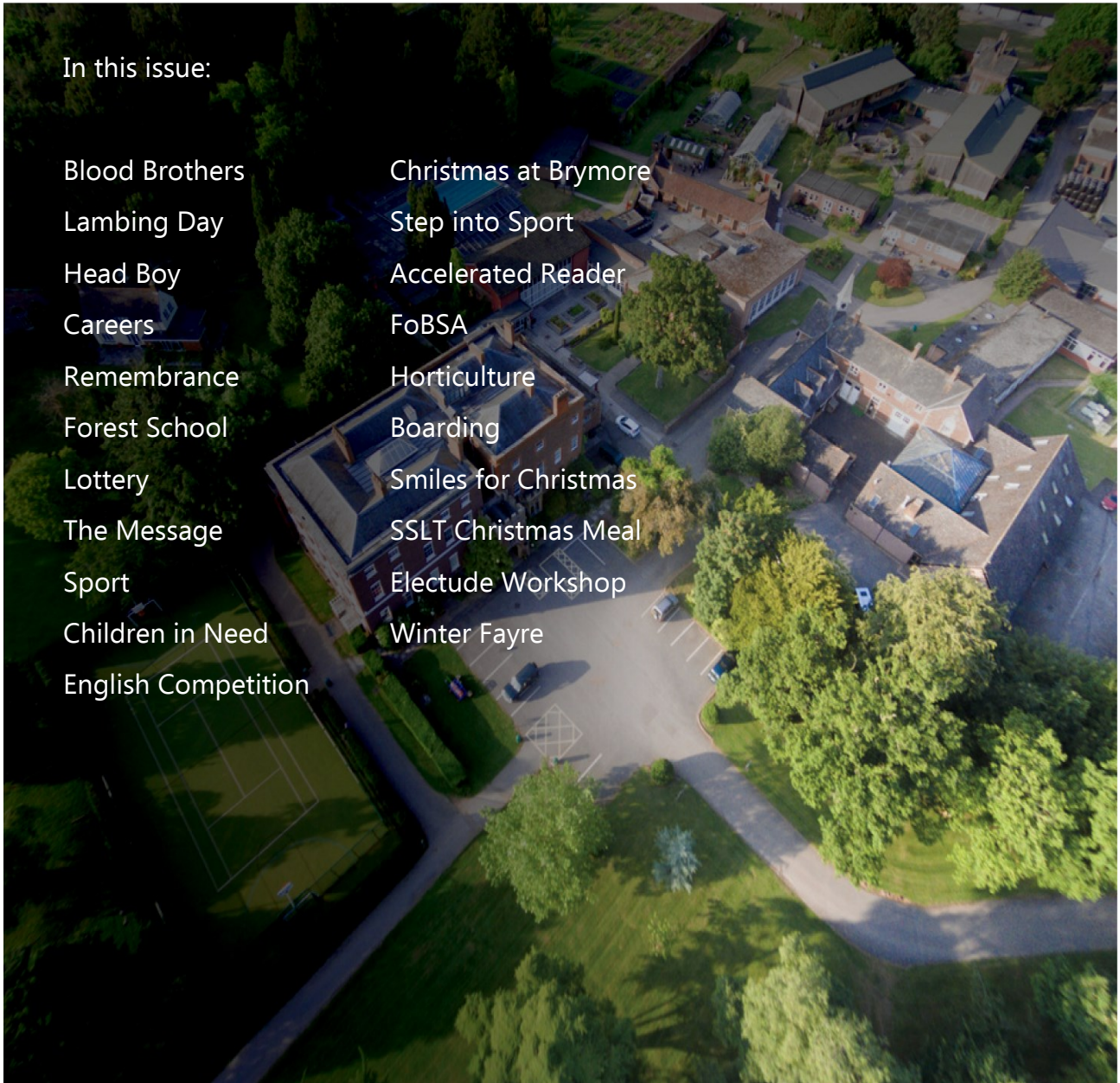

## Message from the Headteacher

It was so lovely to back in St Mary's Church, Cannington this year so that we could all celebrate the start of the Christmas period together. It is something I have really missed and I know many of the older boys, and parents, feel the same way. # Careers

## Employability Skills

This year we are excited to be working with the Skills Builder Partnership. This is a global organisation of employers, educators and impact organisations, working together to ensure that future generations are supported in explicitly developing the most valued employability skills. Skills lessons are being delivered as part of the PSHRE curriculum and students are aiming at progressing through the Skills Builder universal framework. The Framework breaks each of the eight skills down into a sequence of steps, taking individuals from being an absolute beginner through to mastery. It takes soft skills and puts rigour behind them.

If you would like to see for yourself what your son is doing please feel free to visit their website using the QR on the left. Skills Builder also has a website especially for parents 'Homezone' to support them in developing these skills at home should they wish. They have a wealth of free resources to explore.

## Advice and Guidance

This half term students in Years 10 and 11 have had two assemblies from Bridgwater and Taunton College about all of the different qualification options open to them post Year 11. One assembly focussed specifically on T Levels. T Levels are a relatively new qualification designed as an alternative to A levels, apprenticeships and other 16-19 courses. Equivalent in size to three A levels, a T Level focuses on vocational skills and can help students into skilled employment, higher study or apprenticeships.

In the last week of term all Year 11 students each had a 1:1 careers guidance meeting with a Level 6 qualified advisor from a company called FutureSmart. They offer impartial advice about the opportunities and pathways available to them after school. Should they wish to have an additional 1:1 meeting or any other support with post-16 options they need to contact the trust careers lead Mrs Lewis who is also in school every Wednesday.



## Careers Breakfasts

A cohort of boys interested in learning about career opportunities within the Army met with Sergeant Christopher Stone and heard about his own personal journey, and the huge array of roles within the army. We learnt more about training, the adventure and travel opportunities linked to both full time (regular) and part time (reserve) soldiers and officers, and talked about expected standards and values. There were also lots of questions about salary! We heard how initial soldier training starts at £16,844 and increases within just six months rising to a Sergeant at £37,198. This session certainly sparked career curiosity and the boys went away informed on another pathway option open to them in the future

Students also had the opportunity to attend a Careers Breakfast with tutors from BTC's National College for Nuclear. Here they heard about the state of the art facilities they can access, different courses and qualifications offered as well as different career pathways in the nuclear industry.

## Careers Lessons

During the autumn term, all students have received at least one designated careers lesson, the first of three over the course of the academic year. These lessons develop the six career development skills that people need to have positive careers as shown through the work of the *Career Development Institute*.

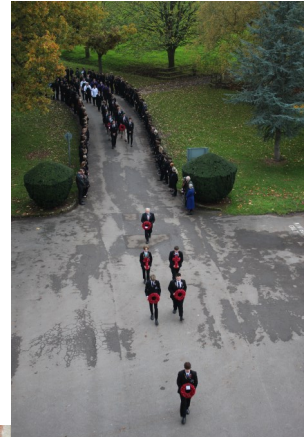
